Our business is behaving a little weird lately. The glass business has been quite strong and seems to be consistent with what I read about the general economic environment. Automotive builds are good and the construction market is improving. The steel industry serves the same end users and they are in the dumps. I just attended the AISTech conference in Cleveland and there are virtually no new projects being planned. The main issue for the steel industry in the US seems to be a surge of imports. The strength of the US dollar and the slowdown in China has made the US market a dumping ground for foreign steel. So, although the steel customers are having pretty good years, the domestic manufacturers have lost market share to imports and are in the process of idling furnaces and shutting down plants. The severe drop in the price of oil has also had an impact on the HPI business. And we seem to be losing some of our traditional cement cooler business to solgel refractories where the plant is getting by without a dryout.

We have been lucky to offset some of the domestic uncertainty with improved activity in Australia and with some large international projects. We still have remaining work to do in Saudi Arabia and Kazakhstan. Mexico activity has been pretty good. We have a lead on some major HPI work in Kuwait but we lost an opportunity for a copper job in the Phillippines. Our first four months of the year are a great start but there remains some uncertainty whether we will be able to sustain it thru our traditional slow period in the summer.

The Hotbels glass seminar was its usual success. Donna and Ryan did a great job and we had over 100 of the main players in the glass industry in Lexington for a couple of days. The BTU award was given to George Kopser for his contribution to the conference and the industry. Smitty participated once again this year and he seems to be getting along just fine. There is more work in the future at this plant and given the difficulty of importing equipment, it may be necessary to use the competitor equipment again. We should try to learn as much about this stuff as we can.
